San Leandro History Walk



Welcome to the San Leandro History Walk!

The San Leandro History Walk will familiarize you with San Leandro's past and help you understand how it has shaped the city that we know today. San Leandro has a rich history that began more than 10,000 years ago with those who first settled the area, the Ohlone people. The arrival of Spanish settlers in the early 1800s spured a rapid transformation of the area. By the latter half of the 19th century, San Leandro's agricultural community was thriving, and San Leandro became incorporated in 1872.

With the arrival of the railroad, the city evolved into a growing industrial and residential community. By the 1900s, San Leandro was a bustling town, with a Key System passenger rail line that ran along East 14th Street. The boom years for residential growth occurred after World War II. Today. San Leandro is a diverse community with a strong economy that capitalizes on its excellent climate and central location in the San Francisco Bay Area.

Although you can begin at any point along the History Walk a logical start is at the History Wall, located at the transit plaza at East 14th and Davis streets. The Wall describes the historic progression of the city and its downtown area. Three major markers located along West Estudillo Avenue highlight the development of San Leandro from its first settiers to its transformation into an urban community. Smaller informational markers are located in the greater downtown area that describe historic buildings and slites and significant community leaders.
