Improving Rail Operations



South Bay Connect – A key rail improvement project that will:


- Enhance reliability, access, and travel time for Capitol Corridor riders
 - Reduce train congestion between Oakland and San Jose
 - Improve rail operations for passenger & freight service



What is South Bay Connect?



- Capitol Corridor route relocation (Oakland Coliseum to Newark)
- Two discontinued Capitol Corridor stations (Hayward & Fremont-Centerville)
- New Ardenwood intermodal station (existing transbay bus & shuttle connections)
- No frequency increase in Capitol Corridor service or expected changes to freight operations
- Potential improvements to UP rail line (Industrial Parkway & Shinn Connection)




Union Pacific Railroad (UP) Coordination



Capitol Corridor's goal is to find the <u>least expensive and</u>
<u>environmentally impactful infrastructure improvement options</u> that
facilitate rerouting of freight and passenger rail trains.

- UP committed to finding feasible solutions for both freight and passenger rail improvements
- Track infrastructure improvements on UP ROW will facilitate rerouting of freight to accommodate Capitol Corridor service relocation
- UP has stated that SBC creates opportunity for more efficient operations through East Bay
 - Freight frequency is market driven


